The Board decided to pitch in and go through the year with each acting as a liaison for a different committee. While it was new territory, things went very well with a huge thanks to Board members for all of their help. We ended up with **membership continuing to exceed 100**, great use of our beautiful space, excellent demos and workshops, new technology equipment, and a well-attended and fun potluck holiday party! The Workshops were very successful allowing MAA to offer two scholarships — one for \$3,000 and one for \$1,000. It was the strength of our leadership and participation across the MAA member base that made the year such a success!!

LEADERSHIP. Thanks to all who provided outstanding leadership, service, and commitment for the 2023-24 year. The following team is in place for 2024-25 which positions MAA well for another great year.

MEETINGS. Our facility at the Manchester Church of Christ, so generously offered for free, served us well for all of our recurring functions – monthly Board and Member meetings, frequent workshops, and weekly Open Studios. The spacious, well-lit Fellowship Hall accommodated our numbers easily - whatever the activity. Member meetings were held there in September, October, November, March, April, and May. December's meeting was a wonderful pot luck dinner enjoyed by all who came and brought delicious food. January and February meetings were held on Zoom. In addition to avoiding weather cancellations, the Zoom meetings allowed us to invite guest artists who would otherwise be beyond traveling distance. MAA donated \$1,000 to the church to help defray utility costs; it was well received.

MEMBERSHIP. Membership was directed by co-chairs Carolyn Gimbrone and Karen Waggoner. Not only do Carolyn and Karen attend every meeting to pass out name tags and greet members, they are active behind the scenes reconciling membership spreadsheets, communicating with members, and picking up mail at MAA's PO Box. The numbers continue to be good in that we finished the year with 107 members – which includes our two new scholarship winners (more on that later). Dues remained at \$35/per person, \$45/family rate.

MINUTES. Secretary Judith Goldstein takes minutes at the Board and Member meetings. Her attention to specifics and detail helped document progress and decisions at meetings. Thank you Judith! All member meeting minutes are available on the website; Board and Member meeting minutes are all on the MAA's shared drive.

TREASURY. Lisa Dumais kept meticulous books throughout the year. We started with \$17.9k and finished with \$15.6k – which includes the yet to be paid \$4,000 in MAA scholarships. Membership dues were over budget by almost 50% and MAA received well over \$1k in very generous donations. Financial results were also helped by an extra watercolor workshop by Joe Burger. The Board approved the purchase of tech equipment – slide projector, camera, cabling, etc. to be able to show Demo/Workshop artists on the big screen at meetings/workshops. This was the second single biggest expense vs. last year (over scholarships). Finally, having a pot luck holiday savings cost a bit in supplies but turned out to be much less expensive than one held at the restaurant the year before.

- \$1,000 Scholarship. Maya Hathorn, South Windsor High School. Matriculating to Ithaca College to study Art Education

A great deal of time is spent on these functions which most members don't see happening because things go so very smoothly. There's so much work that goes into the newsletters – including riding herd over all of our comments, changes, and edits. Chris – we thank you very, very much.

HOSPITALITY. Gail Crook (chair), Judy Burnham, and Nancy Post arrive before the start of every meeting to get coffee and tea ready and set out goodies for the Member meetings. In addition to this, they were instrumental in our successful holiday party making sure we had the right amount and selection of goodies, supplies, and set up. They are very much appreciated as they get everything ready and then clean up thoroughly afterwards. Thank you all.

FUTURE PLANS. The Board should remain focused on living up to our mission of bringing artists and art-loving people together, encouraging artistic growth in and around Manchester, and fostering interest in all forms of artistic expression.

2025 will be the 75th anniversary of the founding of MAA. Our past presidents, Carolyn Gimbrone, Carolyn Emerson, Erik Vogel, and Chris Larson have accepted the challenge/task of running MAA's next fundraiser. After the wonderful success of our fundraiser in 2023, we look forward to another fundraising triumph.

CLOSING REMARKS. This year could have been one where the MAA ship ran aground with the change in leadership so early in the year. But, true to our form, the MAA members and leadership stepped up to make it another wonderfully successful year – in meetings, demos, workshops, exhibits, communications, and so much more. We have a gift of exceptionally dedicated people who came together to make the organization not only work but shine. Thanks to all who were part of this great year!
